

Asked to say a bit about studying philosophy at App State and his plans for the future, Sabai responded:

Dr. Sandie Gravett (Professor of Religious Studies) was the recipient of the 2022-23 College of Arts & Sciences Jimmy Smith Outstanding Service Award.



The award honors a faculty member who has demonstrated meaningful and significant service to the College, the University and/or the faculty member's profession. Having joined App State in 1996, Dr. Gravett has maintained a significant track record of service to the Department of Philosophy & Religion, the College of Arts & Sciences, the university at large, the UNC system, and the field of religious studies.

At the department level, Dr. Gravett has frequently served as Chair of the Religious Studies Curriculum Committee, shepherding untold numbers of curricular proposals from early stages of discussion to fruition and publication in the undergraduate bulletin. Recent notable service at the university and system levels includes drafting the Faculty *Constitution* and collaborating on the drafting of a significantly revised *Faculty Handbook*.

A colleague who nominated Dr. Gravett for this award commented, "Dr. Gravett's contributions to service are staggering. That she does all this while maintaining a standard teaching load and research profile is astounding."

Dr. Conrad "Ozzie" Ostwalt (Professor of Religious Studies) was the recipient of the 2023-24 College of Arts & Sciences Excellence in Engagement Award.



This award honors a faculty member in the College of Arts and Sciences with outstanding accomplishments in engagement, defined as representing the university to cultivate partnerships and initiatives that address community issues, enhance scholarship, research and creative activities, support curriculum, teaching and learning, and contribute to the public good.

Much of Dr. Ostwalt's engagement has come in the form of "Religion in Life," an award-winning television series that he produces and hosts. Recent guests have included community members associated with F.A.R.M. Café, the Islamic Center of Boone, and App State's Center for Judaic, Holocaust, and Peace Studies.

A colleague who nominated Dr. Ostwalt for this award noted, "By building connections among people of many faith communities and secular audiences locally and regionally, Ozzie has enhanced the quality of life of citizens of North Carolina in tangible ways, promoting dialogue, mutual understanding and community-building."

Dr. Randy Reed (Professor of Religious Studies) was inducted in the College of Arts & Sciences Academy of Outstanding Teachers and was the recipient of the College's 2023-24 Tenure-Track Teacher of the Year Award.



Dr. Reed teaches a wide range of courses, in face-to-face and online formats. These include the department's most popularly enrolled course, REL 1010 Religion and Imaginary Worlds, as well as advanced specialized courses such as "AI, VR, and Ethics," co-taught with **Dr. Christopher Bartel (Professor of Philosophy)**. For several years, Dr. Reed has also co-led a summer course abroad ("Love, Sex, and Power") in France and Italy with **Dr. Jack Kwong (Professor of Philosophy)**. Dr. Reed collaborates with students in research at the intersection of the humanities and digital technology, exploring implications of artificial intelligence for the future of religion. Students and colleagues alike appreciate his deep knowledge, passion for teaching, skill as an explainer and explorer of new technology and devotion to students' personal and intellectual growth.

A colleague who nominated Dr. Reed for these awards observed, "He has never seen a wait list he didn't want to eliminate; if there are students who wish to learn from him, he will make every effort to bring them into the fold."

Richard 'Tommy' Guy '07 was the recipient of the 2023-24 College of Arts & Sciences Outstanding Alumni Award. The award honors alumni who have distinguished themselves through their remarkable contributions to a profession, through their ability to provide leadership, through public service activities, through outstanding creative endeavors or through other accomplishments.

Guy was a double major in Philosophy & Religion and Mathematics and is now a principal architect and data scientist at Microsoft, where he leads efforts in big data analytics and artificial intelligence. Guy connects his majors by their shared reliance upon logic: "Both disciplines force learners to articulate and defend their thinking — whether constructing a geometric proof or justifying a worldview."

Guy has established multiple scholarships for students at App State, including the Richard T. Guy Scholarship for Philosophy majors.
